And oh, so many balls of leftovers, perfect for those small items or larger, multicolor sweaters and blankets. Some may require doubling of the thin threads with those of a second ball for a thicker, easier to use yarn.

As we cuddle in our nice warm homes, just give a little thought to those not quite so fortunate. Just maybe we can make a difference for those in need, both in the remote areas in Appalachia and those in our own communities. We have the knowledge, the supplies and desire...let's make a difference in any way we can!

Wednesday Morning Classes/Workshops

We have added three more mini classes/workshops to our schedule. All workshops are limited to 8 registrants so please contact me (Tricia: phone 804-683-9015, or email triciaennis2014@gmail.com) asap if you wish to take a class. If interest warrants, the class will be offered again later in the year. All classes take place on Wednesday mornings from 10:00am until noon at the Workshop on Westbriar Drive. The added classes are:

Wednesday, February 6: Nancy Stallard will teach a mini-workshop on Tunisian Crochet. You will learn to make the Tunisian Crochet Simple Stitch and Nancy also has a couple of smaller projects up her sleeve to get you started. Yarn will be provided but you should bring an "I" size crochet hook with a rubber band on the end. A basic knowledge of crochet is required, and it helps if you know how to make a knit stitch (knitting).

Wednesday, February 13th: Tricia Ennis will lead a workshop on various types of slip stitching. Slip stitches create very interesting fabrics with a somewhat Fair-Isle appearance. Yarn will be provided, and we will have some #8 needles available but please bring a pair of straight #8 needles if you have them. You should be able to cast on, knit, and purl to attend this workshop.

Wednesday, February 20th: Lois Moore will teach a class on how to crochet and fill Port Pillows. These are little pillows for use between the entry point of a chemotherapy port and, for example, a seatbelt. Bring an "H" (5mm) hook and about 1.5 oz, durable, leftover, worsted weight yarn (there are plenty of leftovers at the Workshop). You should be able to chain, sc, and slip stitch to register for this workshop.

The only thing you need to keep in mind is that we have no desire to compete with our local yarn shops and will only teach methods/techniques which are of use in our From the Heart work. That being said, we would love to expand our "pool" of teachers so welcome you to put your thinking cap on and see what you might like to do.

Inclement Weather Policy Clarification – Please Read



The general rule for From the Heart is "If the schools are closed *or opening late*, the Workshop will be closed."

To help clarify this policy, as there are many school districts in the Richmond area, and to make it more understandable to our members, it has been decided that, we will only consider the following areas which immediately surround the Workshop; **Chesterfield, Henrico, and Richmond City** public schools.

If you live in an "outlying" county such as Goochland, Powhatan, Hanover, etc., and your schools are closed/opening late, please check to see if Chesterfield, Henrico, and/or Richmond City are open. If they are (and not opening late), the Workshop will be open.

If we need to close on a Saturday, an email will be sent on Friday evening to alert you.

Comfort Cases

United Methodist Women of First United Methodist Church in Hopewell VA are supporting RVA Comfort Cases. RVA Comfort Cases is a "chapter" of the national organization.

Comfort Cases began in 2012 and RVA Comfort Cases began 2 years ago. The purpose is to provide essentials for children who are entering Foster care.

Then they'll create hats, blankets, and scarves that



represent homemade love.

From the Heart is a needlework charity based in Richmond that donates homemade goods to local hospitals, continuing care homes and other people in need. *From the Heart* started meeting at the library less

than six months ago and the program has gone from strength to strength. Final Call for Vests for Wise County

We will stop collecting hand-made vests for Wise County at the end of February, so please have anything you have, or are, making into the Workshop no later than Thursday February 28th.

We still have a few kits on the left-hand side on the yarn hall as you enter it. The kits are marked with the size garment the yarn is intended for. These kits will be dismantled, and the yarn returned to the cubbies at the

end of the month so, if you want one, you should plan to take it next time you visit the Workshop.

Patterns are also available in the binders alongside the assembled kits so feel free to look through those too if you wish. Bear in mind, however, that you can create a vest from whatever pattern you have to hand and don't have to use a From the Heart pattern. Just make something you like.

Once your vest is complete, please make a notation as to the size and the care of the garment. You can do this on the back of its Fth tag or, if you don't have a tag, just write it on a piece of paper and include with the vest. The Elf who takes it in at the Workshop will write your instructions on the tag s/he attaches to the vest.

Thank you all for contributing to this project. The vests will be distributed to people at one of the Remote Area Access Medical events.

Tip of the Month

Stocking stitch (stockinette) edges curl so what can you do about it? You can with the edges by

1. Adding a pattern stitch at the beginning and end of each row, something as simple as making 4 or 5 stitches garter instead of stockinette will work.
2. Making a chain edge, which is really quite pretty by, at the end of each row, slip the last stitch with the yarn held in front and, then, at the beginning of the next row, knit this slipped stitch.
3. If you are knitting a straight stockinette fabric (say for a hat), you can allow the curl to “pretend” it is intentional as the curled edge actually makes a nice brim or start out with a rib or garter stitch.

Knitted Blanket

Worsted weight yarn is several colors.

Size 8 knitting needles.

65 stitches creates a blanket only approx. 13 or 14 inches wide. You want a blanket 30 – 32” wide

Pattern is an 11 stitch repeat as follows:

Row 1: k2tog, k3, yo, k1, yo, k3, sl1, k1, pss0, repeat to end.

Row 2: Purl

To prevent edge curling, begin by working at least 6 rows of garter stitch (knit every row). When working the body of the blanket begin and end every row by knitting those 5 edge stitches.

Cast on enough stitches (figuring 11 per pattern repeat) plus at least 10 additional to allow a 5-stitch border on the sides to match the beginning garter stitch edge.



Directions:

Cast on stitches. When knitting first row, place a marker after first 5 stitches, after each set of 11 stitches that follow and before the last 5 stitches of the row.

Work garter stitch border for 6 rows.

Using colors of your choice, work each shade for at least 6 rows. Always start your new color on a right-side facing row.

Row 7: Knit 5, slip marker, knit each set of 11 following row 1 of pattern stitches, slip markers as you stitch. After slipping final marker, knit 5. Turn

Reverse side: Always knit first and last 5 stitches. Purl all stitches between border markers.

Continue until desired size of 60”

Last 6 rows: You may like to work these rows in same color as beginning 6 rows. Knit all stitches, bind off loosely.

Crocheted Blanket

P Hook

2 skeins Homespun

Directions:

Chain (ch) 40 or as many as you need to create a chain 32” wide, half double crochet (hdc) in 2nd chain from hook, hdc in each chain.

Chain 2, hdc across, ch 2, turn.

Hdc in each hdc across, ch 3, turn.

Double crochet (dc) in each hdc across, ch 3, turn.

Repeat the row about 2 more times. On second row ch2, turn.

Crochet three rows of hdc then 3 rows of dc.

Repeat this pattern until blanket is approximately 60” long

End with three hdc rows and then a single crochet row.

Ch1, then single crochet around the entire blanket.

Cut yarn and weave in all ends.
