Made by Gootie is a really great site for both knitters and crocheters alike, with a super handy search button on the home page. Type in whatever you are looking for, "Halloween" and "Christmas Gifts" come to mind immediately as both are rapidly approaching, and you will be amazed at the number of ideas, patterns, and even tutorials which may pop up. This site's home page currently has free patterns and tutorials for many different crochet stitches with which to make a Corner

to Corner (C2C) blanket. This site is well worth an hour or so of your time.


The Craft Yarn Council has a really excellent <u>Project Center</u> where you will find both knit and crochet patterns broken down by category and type. The side bar on the page allows you to travel all over the site with the click of your mouse.

<u>Sewing Support</u> is a site where you can find all manner of free sewing patterns for all manner of items, including quilts. It even contains links to books on Amazon which may be of interest to our sewers.

AND don't forget your local library. Most libraries still have excellent crafting sections.

#### What's in a Name?

If you are planning to attend the Retreat this year on Saturday, October 7<sup>th</sup>, one of the raffle items will be a little different than anything we have ever raffled before.



One of From the Heart's members is a well-known author who publishes under the nom de plume A.J. Rivers. The books center on the assignments and career of FBI agent Emma Griffin. "A.J. Rivers" likes to use her knowledge of real-life events, places, and

people as building blocks for her fictional stories.

One of "A.J."'s more recent books is "The Girl and the Deadly Secrets", which is about a charitable organization called From Heart to Heart, whose President Tricia Donovan unfortunately ends up a murder victim

#### A few excerpts:

"I... pull(ed) out a couple of the things Lois and Shawna gave me. 'These were made by Tricia and Sherry. Not too long before they were killed I'd have to guess since they were still at the workshop.'

"...It was on display next to the white board in the front room."

"...I shake my head, confused. "A code? What do you

mean?" 'Look, these patterns repeat consistently throughout the pieces, but they don't make sense...'

"I bring up the list of recipients and clients the group works with... The list has everything I would expect. Battered women's shelters, homeless shelters, halfway houses..."

"This is Pat Ledger. She took over as head of From Heart to Heart after the death of Tricia Donovan."

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We have been given a copy of this book to be used as a raffle item at the retreat and the author is willing to sign it for the lucky winner. \$1 for one ticket or \$5 for 6 tickets could win you the book which brings From the Heart to international attention under the name From Heart to Heart (and you might be in it, albeit a little disguised).

As this article's title asks, What's in a Name? Ut is such an honor that "A.J." has used her knowledge of From the Heart to immortalize the organization and our work in a book.

# The Joy of Recipients

We all know what we do and why we do it, but we don't always have the satisfaction of seeing how much joy the recipients of the items have when they are given them. So many people, who when they are given something we have made, respond with "What, for ME??", or "It's free? But it is beautiful. I get to keep it and take it home?"

Melissa H sent this photo of a few of the clients she works with modeling, with great pleasure, some of the items From the Heart has given to Alliance Family Counseling



Group for donation to their clients. They offer mental health skill building, crisis stabilization, and outpatient therapy to their clients.

Among Alliance's clients are many homeless people so, if there is anyone who likes to work with plarn (plastic yarn made from cutting plastic bags into strips and knotting the strips together), to create sleeping mats for the homeless, Alliance would be thrilled to receive them.

### **Knit Basketweave Blanket Square**

Size of the finished square depends on the needle used and the weight of the yarn used. Make as many squares as you think would be joined to make a blanket of the size you want.

With needle size 7, 8, 9 or 10, cast on 30 stitches.

Rows 1, 2, 3: Knit all stitches.

**Pattern rows 4 – 8:** Knit 10, Purl 5, Knit 5, Purl 5, Knit 5. Pattern rows 9 – 13: Knit 5, Purl 5, Knit 5, Purl 5, Knit 10.

Work these 10 pattern rows 2 more times, then work rows 4 through 8 once more.

Knit 3 rows.

Cast off, leaving a long enough tail to use to join this piece to another square.

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# **Crochet Blocks of Drops Afghan**

This pattern is a great way to use up scraps. Any weight yarn can be used with a corresponding size crochet hook. Use your imagination when deciding on colors as the possibilities are endless. Change colors after every two rows as making only two rows of each color makes the drops really pop out nicely.

#### **Abbreviations:**

Ch chain

DC double crochet

**NOTE:** When creating your drop stitches, when you yarn over and pull your yarn through the stitch 2 rows down, be sure to create an elongated loop to prevent puckering.



#### Pattern:

Chain to desired width of afghan using **odd** multiples of 6, plus 4. Worsted weight yarn, an "H" hook, and a chain of 106 gives a blanket with a width of approximately 30". (106 =  $6 \times 17 = 102 + 4 = 106$ )

- **Row 1:** DC in 4<sup>th</sup> chain from hook and in the next 2 chains this makes your first group of 3 DCs. \*Skip next 3 chains, ch 3, DC in next 3 chains. Repeat across from \* to the end until you have 4 chains left. Ch 3, skip 3 chains, DC in last chain, ch 3, and turn.
- **Row 2:** \*DC in each of the 3 chains (2 rows down) to create your "drop stitches", ch 3 (to form a bridge to the next set of 3 chains) repeat from \* to the end of the row until you have 3 stitches left. Finish with a ch 3, DC in top of the turning ch, ch 3, and turn (ch 3 is for turning chain).
- Row 3 \*DC in each of the 3 DCs (2 rows down), ch 3, repeat from \* to the end finishing with a DC in turning chain, ch 3, and turn.

Repeat row 3 until desired length.

**Border:** 2 rows of SC around entire blanket.
